The Center for Men and Masculinity (CFMM)

We believe that it is time to make an earnest effort to think about how boys become men, and how men become fathers.

This earnest effort expresses itself in unique clinical responses to the struggles of boys and to the questions raised by those struggles: Are we sure we really understand why 80% of the children diagnosed with ADHD are boys? Do schools and families understand the connection between boys hitting and boys grieving?

This effort also expresses itself through active clinical support of men who never found the path to an adult role in the world, and through activating the wider community to give similar support.

It expresses itself in a hunger to understand what rituals, family support and understanding males need to move from childhood fear and self-centeredness into adult capacities that will enable them to love, experience empathy and take on caretaking duties as if they could not do otherwise.

It expresses itself in creating conversations among men where we can better understand our use of false power, bravado and stoicism to defend against our fear and uncertainty. Several therapists in the C-U area have come together in this earnest effort, and we are the Center for Men and Masculinity. We are part of The Infant-Parent Institute which has, for many years, insisted on looking at the whole developmental picture of a person (from infancy through adult life) to understand present problems and conflicts.
